TAFE at Schools Semester 2, 2019 Course Offerings

Students in the Senior School have many pathways to achieve their Queensland Certificate of Education. A number choose to complete Nationally recognised courses whilst completing their Senior. Included below is information on Semester Two offerings through the TAFE at Schools Program.

Applications are now open for the TAFE at School Semester 2, 2019 intake. Please see attached [at the back of the newsletter](#) a price guide for the programs available to start in semester 2.

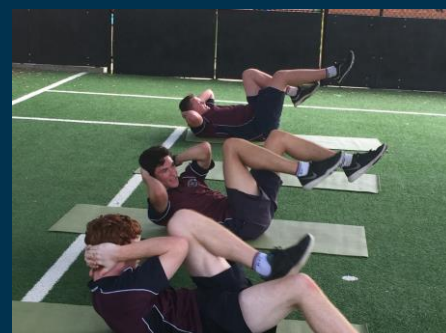

Middle School Update

A warm welcome back is extended to new and returning students, parents and families. We hope that the holidays provided some well deserved rest after the business of term one. Term two promises to carry on with the hive of activity, and challenge students to engage in activities that offer them a chance to work outside of their comfort zones.

In week one, students reconnected with their catamaran families, shared their holidays tales and and engaged in curriculum immersion lessons. Our theme for term two is "Make it Happen" and culminates in the Kimberley College Fundraising Fair in week ten. Our thematic approach to learning will offer students engaging content across all of our subject areas, with a focus on empowerment and advocacy.

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Curriculum

Our curriculum writing teams have designed our term two units inspired by the theme “Make it Happen” are ready for implementation in the areas of Science, Mathematics, English, Theme Studies, Social Science, Visual Art, LOTE, Music, Human Relationships and Physical Education.

Theme Studies this term provides students with the opportunity to engage in a rich and deep exploration of an international or domestic region experiencing an extreme humanitarian issue. The goal of this cultural immersion is to increase student global awareness and examine topical issues. Student work culminates in two phases, firstly, in a walk through museum in week 6 and secondly, showcased in the ‘Hub’ Information Market at the fundraising fair.

Our Mathematics unit “Change for Change” develops students’ skills in the curriculum strand of Number and algebra. Students will learn and refine skills in working with rates and ratios, through to advanced algebraic concepts.

Students are reading John Marsden’s book, “Tomorrow When The War Began”, for our English unit “Into the Wild”. They will explore social and psychological constructs including community, human rights, self actualisation, and the transition from childhood to adulthood.

The Social Science unit “Earth Shakers” offers students an opportunity to become active global citizens by analysing the impacts of the media, examining their own roles in global issues, and identifying opportunities for personal agency in finding solutions to global problems.

In science, “Fantasy of Flight” immerses students in the (scientific) magic of flight! This unit provides students a pathway into the study of the physical sciences, and culminates in a classroom flying machine competition, with the opportunity to participate in the ‘Flight Competition’ at the fair in week 10.

It is all things athletics in Health and Physical Education classes this term. Students will refine their technique and movement skills in track and field events, leading to our Sports Carnival in week 9

In Japanese classes, students will focus on extending their foundational knowledge by further immersing themselves in Japanese culture, specifically sports, and physical movement. A highlight of this unit of study will most certainly be sumo wrestling later in the term. Students are excited at the prospect of learning about this age-old sport and extending their Japanese vocabulary.

Our studies of the Arts began with middle school students immersing themselves in their first Visual and Creative Art lesson with Miss Leeuwendal. Visual and Creative Arts is closely tied into Theme Studies this term and has been tailored to examine art forms and culture specific to each classroom's focus country. In music lessons, students will continue their deconstruction of musical compositions, and creating their own pieces that demonstrate the power of words.

Primary School Update

Welcome back primary families and friends. We hope that you all had an enjoyable Easter break. This term, we have hit the ground running in the primary school. The students have already had an event filled first week, and there are plenty of exciting adventures to look forward to in the coming weeks.

In Kokomini this term, the students are going to become a 'World Traveller' as they follow their friend, Huggle Buggle Bear, around the world. Each week, Huggle Buggle Bear will introduce the children to a different country and they will be immersed into a discovery of the language and culture of the people who live there.

The students of Kokomini are also very excited to begin *Bush School*. This term, the students will learn how to take care for the environment and become 'Guardians of the Land' through hands on experiences and outdoor play.

The students of Kokowara will be immersed in their theme 'Around the World in 80 Days'. During their studies, the students will travel to different continents to explore and experience cultures and traditions, songs, dances, crafts, stories, and food from the continent they are visiting. Through weekly cooking experiences, of food from around the world, the students will explore chemical reactions and learn how to write procedural texts.

This term, students in Waka Waka will have the opportunity to explore Papua New Guinea as part of their theme 'Who's Your Neighbour'. They will look at where the country is, the landscape and climate. They will also be immersed into the culture and will experience traditions from Indigenous people, including cooking and art. In preparing for the annual Kimberley College Fair, the students will experiment with simple machines and create a Rube Goldberg machine. They will also discuss the differences between needs and wants, by comparing the needs of others to their own. Students will have the opportunity to develop a HUB presentation in Rich Task using the knowledge learnt throughout the term.

Gubbi Gubbi this term will be exploring the theme, 'Global Communities'. The key focus of their study will be Mongolia. As a part of their studies, they will explore imports and exports from Mongolia and the needs and wants of themselves and others. They will also be immersed in Mongolian art, music and cooking as they prepare for the Fair, and share their findings in a HUB.

On Wednesday 24th April, the students participated in our annual primary cross country carnival. The primary school was a sea of colour and chants, and the students wore their house colours with pride and looked fabulous! We are extremely proud of the way that all children participated and showed team spirit and sportsmanship through supporting their peers. Thank you to all of our families and friends who could make it on the day. We were very excited to have you there cheering us on!

The Power of Reflective Conversations

Parenting and teaching and many other occupations can be complex and uncertain at times. Parenting is by far the hardest job we have and ironically, does not come with a manual, a training course or does it require any qualifications. However, over the centuries we have all been able to adapt, and improve our practices as parents, judge our impact on our children's wellbeing and impart our cultural and traditional beliefs and traditions. Despite the struggles we have with our children, we, as parents, are learning to nurture and respond to another human being who, typically, has their own personality, needs, learning styles and ways of responding.

This twenty-first century that we are living in is not waiting for any of us! We are constantly experiencing rapid changes in demographics, workplace demands, technologies and especially parenting pressures to raise confident and competent children. Parenting styles are impacted by ample research, new trends and different opinions all making our decisions sometimes questionable and challenging our own competencies. However, one part of parenting and building relationships has not changed in this time and that is the humble conversation.

Having a conversation with each other is an art that is lost in some households with so many demands fighting for our attention. Recent research carried out through La Trobe University, in Bendigo, suggests the teaching of reflection to children, self-reflection in particular, contributes to successful development as adolescents and strengthens family ties when offered in conversations with family members.

Reflective conversations can assist people in learning from their experiences, improving relationships and skills and, assist people in developing strategies to overcome life's obstacles and lead to goal attainment. Families can encourage conversations based on daily reflections where each member discusses reflections of their day possibly around what they have learnt, experienced or felt. These conversations can then be expanded to personal and global reflections based on what is going on individually or globally. One of the best skills developed from self-reflections is the learning of responsibility – where a person becomes aware of their part in their experiences.

Below is a list of 5 questions that could be used as reflective family conversation prompts.

1. What is one piece of advice (given to you by a teacher) that you really appreciate?
2. Who looks up to you and why do you think they look up to you?
3. How do you enrich your friends lives?
4. What is your best personality trait and why?
5. How is your behaviour reflective of a good role model to those looking up to you?
